BIG FISH CONTINUED

An increase in dues was among the several issues discussed and resolved during the business portion of the meeting. Upon motion by W8UPH it was decided that dues would be increased to \$7, payable at the Dayton annual meeting and that only dues paid members would be considered eligible to participate in MRRC club competitions. It has become increasingly difficlut to keep the membership informed and unified under the prior arrangement which allowed ARRL defined eligibility for inclusion in the total club score without paying dues. Nondues-paid members did not, of course, receive the 'FLASH'; however, they did enjoy all of the privledges of membership. It's a good change.

Those of you who generally pay your dues at Findlay or the K8MR Christmas Party may do so. It will be considered that they were paid at the 1987 Hamvention. There will be no proration or adjustment. Those of you who did not pay at Dayton in 1986, but were due (there is a RED X on the back of your Flash) may pay \$5 until September 10. After that and dues will be \$7.

- A NEW MEMBER may join MRRC for \$1. A new member is defined as
 - 1. someone who has never been a member of any classification, or
 - 2. someone who has never been a dues paying member, or
 - 3. someone who has not been a member for five years.

The shirt sales program is now on hold until February. If you missed this round, but want a shirt, fill out your order form now and send it to W8LNO. Shirts will be delivered late in February.

Many of you expressed interest in a jacket or hat. I'll put all of the particulars on that process in the next 'Flash'. Caps will run about \$4 and jackets about \$25. I will choose the colors and layout. They will come only one way to assure a minimum number of errors and cut down on the agravation for The OM. Jackets are available through size XXXL, I didn't inquire about the other end of the spectrum. Guess we're mostly LF types.

In this issue is a membership list. IT IS NOT CURRENT, and includes all of the old nondues-payiny members, but it is the best we have K8CC will continue to maintain the membership database and will have it current soon. When a better list is available you will see it in print. If you don't see one it is due to factors other than our mutual interest in telling you everything you want to know.





Directions to N8ET: Exit from I-75 about 10 miles south of Findlay on S.R. 235 north. Go through the blinker light to the stop light in the center of Mt. Cory. At the stoplight turn left (west) on Washington St. (C.R. 26). N8ET is about 1/4 mile west of the stoplight in Mt. Cory on the right (north) side of the road. A map is included in the FLASH, and I will be listening on the Findlay repeater (147.15/75) along with 146.52. It's the only antenna farm in Mt.Cory.





I have been threatening for some time to write a brief piece on packet radio for the FLASH.... It has not happened because I have been spending to much time on my new packet radio station. A few months back I finally received a new MFJ TNC in the mail and after a few days of playing got it on the air. My sleep schedule was then totally

I assume that by now most of you have read something about packet — at least enough to know that there is a box called a TNC (Terminal Node Controller) which goes between your radio and a computer or some sort of terminal, and that you can communicate with other packet equiped stations. If you have listened on 145.01 it is that funny burping noise that you hear. In it's simplest form thats what packet is all about — a 2 meter fm radio, a box called a TNC, and a terminal (such as a C64 with communications software). Most everyone has a 2 meter box. MFJ has a TNC for \$129.95 (not a kit!) and that C64 you got to run Dr.DX can now be used for something. \$130 and you are on the air.

Packet gives you the ability to do a lot more than just talk to other MRRC members. You can leave a message at another station for the operator to find when he next stops by the rig — the operator does not have to be present when the call comes through. Any packet station is also a digipeater — you do not have to have a direct path to the station you are trying to work. For example, when I work K8MR, all our packets go through stations in Toledo, Marblehead (on the lake shore between Toledo and Cleveland) and a station in Cleveland. If Jim does not have his rig on when I call I can also leave a message on a bulletin board in Cleveland, or leave a message on a local bulletin board which will automatically forward it to a board near Jim that night. I have been corresponding with WA8YVR in Indiana that way for some time now.

Packet is an excellent method of passing multipliers in a contest (see the article in NCJ about the YCCC effort in a recent contest...). In the past, multiplier passing has meant another operator on 2, or at least a distraction from the 2 m audio for the operator. Packet would allow the multiplier to be entered by a station, and read off the screen at the operating position of the other station, or many other stations if they were all connected. The screen can be checked when an operator has time — the 2 m chatter will not cover up the BY anymore.

WABYUR is working on setting up a system in the Indy area. A link could be established with them. At present NBET, KBMR, and ADBI are on packet. KS8S is threatening, and I understand there are packet noises in the Michigan area. With the towers in MRRC it will be no problem setting up links from Indy thru Findlay to Detroit, Cleveland, Columbus, and Dayton. A network like that would have to help the multiplier count for all the MRRC multi scores.

If we can get W8LNO on, we could even get the Flash sent out electronically -no more mail delays.

Very shortly I will be putting up a bulletin board here in Mt.Cory on 145.01. The local radio club provided the machine and AD8I provided the software. Spend a few bucks get on packet - and leave me a message on the BBS.

I will have my packet station set up at my pre-Findlay get-together on the 6th of September so everyone can get

some hands on experience.

In case you can't tell, I am enthused about packet it's about the best thing to hit since 3-500z's. Let me know if you get on. GET CONNECTED>>>> 73's - Bill N8ET

CONTEST ADVISORY COMMITTEE SURVEY de W8FN

Most of you have probably seen the article in the latest NCJ by K1DG summarizing the results of the CAC questionnaire which was circulated at the Contest Forum at Dayton, and may have filled one out. For those who have not had an opportunity to register their views on contest matters under consideration by the CAC I have included a copy in this issue of the FLASH. I would like to encourage every MRRC member to complete this questionnaire and return it to me so I can better determine the views of active contesters in the Great Lakes Division. Even if you filled one of these out at Dayton please take the time to do it again, as I do not have access to the Dayton data. PLEASE comment in the space provided if possible; a brief comment conveys much more than a simple "yes" or "no". The CAC will soon be voting on one or more of these items, so it is important to get your two cents worth in now before we adopt a position you may not agree with. Even if you think things should stay pretty much as they are, please so indicate. If you belong to a club with a contingent of contesters please take one of the questionnaires to your next meeting and give me a summary of club sentiment. The CAC can function as it is intended only if we get input from the contest community. Your views are important to keeping the ARRL Contest program running smoothly. Let me hear from YOU.

TO ARRL CONTEST ADVISORY COMMITTEE FROM
CLUB COMPETITION Should the 3-tier system be abandoned and club size simply shown parenthetically to facilitate comparison with peer clubs? Should the 50% meeting attendance requirement for distant club members (>50 miles) be changed to 2 meetings per year? Should the meeting requirement be extended to all club members regardless of distance from the club center (0-175 mi.)? Should DXpeditions by club members be included for club aggregate score? Should operations outside club area (>175 miles) by members living within club area be included for club aggregate score? Should foreign clubs be allowed in club competition now restricted to ARRL affiliated clubs? (DX Contest)
OPERATING FREQUENCIES Should off-limits frequencies be mandated in contest rules so as to leave free portions of each band on contest weekends? Should the 160-meter "dx window" (1825-1830) be enforced by means of disqualification or negation of window contacts? Comment
DX CONTEST Should a world-works-world format (like CQWW) be tried again to bolster dx station activity? Should the cw weekend be moved one week earlier to better separate the two modes? Should VY1 be a separate multiplier from VE8 (as in the 10-meter Contest where states / provinces are also multipliers)? Comment
SECTION SWEEPSTAKES Should VY1 be a separate multiplier from VE8 even though it is not a separate ARRL section (sections are the multipliers)? Should a QRP category be established as exists for many other contests? Comment_
VHF / UHF CONTESTS Should advance publicity by participants (e.g., mailings with suggested times and frequencies) be permitted for non-hf contests? Should a portable-QRP category be created (all gear, power sources and antennas capable of being carried by one person) in order to encourage operation from rare, foot-access grid squares? Should VHF SS revert to counting multipliers once regardless of band (as it was prior to the 1985 contest)? Should VHF SS entrants be spotted 25 grids (as pre-'85 rule)?

It seems like I haven't written in a little while, and that may be because I haven't. Or maybe I can't remember, I'm not sure which. The reason I can't remember is that I can't find my collection of FRC meeting notices! They're packed amongst the rest of my ham radio paper junkpile. I've been kind of busy getting back in the swing of things after vacation. Speaking of vacation, my YL and I had a super time up in VE2 land (I can't believe she knows what VE2 means), visiting Quebec City, Montreal and points in between. I didn't get to see VE2HQ's big 80M yagi, but you can't have everything, especially when you're visiting a large area for only a short time!

Work has been occupying quite a bit of my time lately, but I managed to make the QTH change to K3ZO's without too many problems. Incidentally, Fred has QSYed to YN but it is not certain whether he will be able to obtain a license, given the current political situation in the country. He will be applying, however, and should receive word in a couple of months or so. It would be great if he could be active from there during the contests this fall. He could make YN a trivial multiplier on most of the bands. That seems sort of strange, since it has been so difficult to work in the past couple of years.

I've been on the air quite a bit lately, mostly due to the novelty of having a home station, and a good one at that. Below is a diagram of the current K3ZO antenna farm, with the antennas carefully labelled. The W6PU quad for 20/15/10M really plays. I've been working 20M SSB/CW and 40M CW almost exclusively. Twenty has been excellent into Asia and the Far East between 1000Z and 1200Z, and probably a little past 1200Z as well, but I have to leave for work by then. One thing I noticed about being able to get on every day is that my CW has improved quite a bit. Operating contests a few times a year just doesn't cut it for code practice. I hope to be very active on 80/75M in the fall and will be submitting a detailed DX report to N2SS for publication in the DX bulletin. It should be an interesting season.

For those who have ordered the receiving filters, I plan to resume work on them very soon as I should be all settled in about a week. I still plan to have them completed by CQ WW. K3LR FIELD DAY 1986 by K8MR

The Tim & Jim show returned to the famous Transfer, PA hilltop for the annual June radio orgy; about the 19th such operation by various groups from this location in the past 20 years.

The operation was much the same as last year. The main rig was Tim's C-line, the same 135 foot open wire dipole up 60 feet or so. Adding to the substantial clutter in the tent was the backup TS-830s, TV-502 and 70 watt amp for 2 meters, plus packet equipment consisting of a TR-7625, C-64/Pk-64 and monitor. Next year we have to find a bigger table.

Much to our surprise we found our numbers ahead of last year's record setting pace. Much of this was due to a faster setup which was aided by dry weather this year. The other secret improvement came from me spending so much time setting up and operating the bonus point stations (packet and 24 Mhz) while Tim kept the Q's running on the real bands. It was over 4 hours before I got my first shot at the main rig.

The best rates were a 131 QSO run in 45 minutes on 75 meters at 0300z and an 87 hour on 80 cw at 0500z. The strangest thing was a packet pileup. I was working someone when 3 "connect request" messages showed up at the same time. I eventually got them sorted out and worked, but I do find 40 cw faster and easier. Packet, however, is the neatest way I've seen to send a FD message to the SCM. I checked into a local BBS and got it off in about one minute—no pain, no waiting.

We missed some of the MRRC calls from last year's FD. Hope they will be back next year. See you'in 87.

KUSE FIELD DAY REPORT

The Backwoods Contesters/MRRC Field Day group with operators KU8E, KD8NS, K3JT, and NZ4K operated from a 1200 foot hilltop in rural Adams County Ohio. The setup consisted of a Kenwood TS-830s with two center fed zepps at right angles to each other. Both antennas were at about 60 feet.

In addition, a 160 meter dipole was installed at 50 feet and a 300 foot beverage was rolled out for listening on that band and 75 meters. NZ4K claims it helped a lot on 75 meters.

A satellite station was set up and consisted of an ICOM 251A/Yaseu FT101E and an 11 element Yagi. Unfortunately we never did get a satellite contact, even though we made it into RS-&on one of its passes.

Everything ran pretty smoothly all weekend. No major equipment failures at all. The biggest problem was just getting to the FD site. the road going up the hill was gravel and went straight up! It took us several running starts with the gas pedal on the floor befor4e we made it.
