DVK MODIFICATIONS de Drew, K3PA

[Ed. --Both WD9INF and myself have DVKs and although I can't speak for Ken, my DVK has had some rf problems. This may be just the cure and is offered here just incase you may run across this problem too. K8AQM]

After trying the usual grounding and shielding, I could not eliminate RFI in my DVK. I was able to eliminate the problem by rolling off the response below RF in the audio input and output op amps. To make this change: locate U18(a LF347) on the DVK circuit board. Find R20(47K) and R35(47K unless gain of unit was changed). Bypass both these resistors with a 47 to 100 pf mica or ceramic capacitor. This should improve RFI susceptability greatly.

I also had problems with the DVK and low output mikes. To set the DVK gain appropriately, look at U18(LF347) pin 7 on an oscilloscope. In your normal on the air voice, you should see 2Y peak-to-peak here on voice peaks. If the signal is too small, increase the value of R35 proportionally, and vice versa. When properly set, the back panel gain control should be at 9-11 o'clock for the correct output to the radio.

W8FN 844 / 76 K8MR 733 / 75 K8AQM 676 / 75 K8JM op W8CAR 505 / 70 K8CC 151 / 49 N8CXX 100 / 48 Imagine yourself (it won't be difficult if it has happened to you) having just made a serious effort in a major contest. You are pleased with your performance and anxiously await the published results. Several months later that magazine arrives and you quickly locate the results it contains. You look first at the leaders box which should contain your score, but it's not there! You go to the line scores and it is not there either. You frantically check the disqualifications, checklogs and the entire article but your entry is nowhere to be found.

Sure, you remember other substantial scores of other operators in the past which never made it to print, but that was because they failed to send them in. You, however, distinctly recall the events of preparing and sending in your entry. Yes, it was completed and mailed in!

The next day you phone the contest results author and he checks his records. "No, we don't have any record of receiving them. They must have gotten lost in the mail." Your heart drops with bitter disappointment. All of that preparation, operating, final compilation and work for nought.

Is this just a contester's nightmare? Well, the above scenario recently happened to Pat NZ4K who operated WB8JBM in the 1989 ARRL DX phone contest. His 20 meter single band score should have been #1 in the USA! It was over 430K with the next closest score at 236K. That may not seem like quite an accomplishment to many, but from out here in the Midwest those kinds of honors are difficult to come by.

I'm sure this is not the first occurrence of this sort of thing and others have experienced the same trauma in the past. If you have avoided this problem so far, that's good. But it may be wise to take a few precautionary steps to be sure that it doesn't ever happen to you. I know we will from now on.

The simplest and least expensive is the self-addressed stamped card that you may include with your entry. You may even have a place on the card for the person receiving the logs to sign. Be sure to put it on top and maybe use a non-white card so that it will be noticed immediately. The card will be sent back to you confirming the receipt of your logs. If you don't receive your card back in a week or two, better do some checking.

Another effective but slightly more expensive method is to make a quick phone call to the log collector some time after you have sent them in. There is something about hearing directly from the person in charge that he has your logs in hand. In either of the above methods, send your logs in "First Class". The rate for a typical sized entry is about the same as third class anyway.

Some have sent their logs in by registered mail. This is a little more expensive, but it seems to assure the logs reach their destination on the first try.

Having the high-claimed scores published early is also beneficial. If your score isn't in there and it should have been, it allows time to get it straightened out. This also addresses any improper categorization of logs received.

I hope this information has been beneficial and will prevent someone else from going through the same disappointment in the future.
