The plaque is waiting to be claimed by this year's champion. Good luck to all the FD groups, I suspect the competition (or perhaps the mosquitos) will be fierce.

July brings the first MRRC meeting of the summer. Things start in Michigan as Ted, K8AQM/7J3ABO, will host a meeting on July 18th. It will be interesting to see how those new Icom boxes look in place of the 820s in Ted's shack. Directions to to the Adrian meeting appear elswhere in this issue, hope to see you there.

Another meeting is slated for August 1st at the KN8Z homestead. Swimming, barbeque, and a tour of Doc's station are among the planned activities. You can even ask Doc why he uses **kilowatt** toroids on his <u>receive</u> antennas! Other meetings include the Findlay Hamfest, WD8LLD (October), and K8MR (January). A reminder that Dave, K8CC, is compiling Station Profiles and will establish a new Station Rating System for the benefit of the club. This is an excellent way to **compare your results** with similarly equipped stations and scope out possibilities for a multi-op or guest-op position. Please send your station information to Dave and let us know what's happening at your station.

Also the MRRC Championship begins with the upcoming contest season. Jeff, KU8E, will keep track of the scores. Jeff and Jim, K8MR, will devise the point structure which will use a weighted scoring system. I suspect the scoring will be similar to that used by the NCJ and/or the WRTC championship competitions. If you have any questions, ideas, or suggestions for scoring, categories, etc..., please contact Jeff, Jim, or myself.

The ARRL Contest Advisory Committee is studying new ideas for club competitions. New club categories may be instated for the ARRL 10 and 160 meter contests. While 8-land is not the prime location for 10 meter contests, we are well placed to be a **dominant force** on 160. Over past years, many MRRC members have placed highly and even won 160 contests on a national scale. If new club categories are implemented, MRRC should strive to become the first ever 160 meter club champion. This may be the only chance for the club to enjoy a geographic advantage like the East Coasters have for DX contests and the Texans/West Coasters for domestic contests.

And finally, a few words about my role as **BIG FISH**. Basically, Mad River is fine as it is and I intend to keep things pretty much the same. My goals as Big Fish are simple: 1) Get Mad River stations on during contests. 2) Turn in all logs. 3) Recruit new operators/members. and 4) Enjoy operating. Actually, achieving these goals is pretty easy, but their success depends mainly on you. Go Mad River!

One of the best parts about amateur radio is the opportunity it affords for meeting fellow hams. As contesters, we are doubly fortunate in that when we get together with like-minded hams, we share specific interests within our fine hobby, which usually leads to a pretty good time.

Such was the case for me recently, when I found myself in southern W6 on business only a week after the trouble in Los Angeles. Fortunately, my trip took me somewhat south of LA to Orange County (ORG for us SSers) rather than downtown. After two intense days of business, it was time for some amateur radio.

First, I needed some wheels. The woman at the car rental desk at Orange Country airport was quite cooperative, and for only \$5 over the base rate, she handed me the keys to a Chrysler LeBaron convertible. (The convertible turned out to be a mixed blessing - not being used to the southern latitude sun, I managed to acquire a nasty sunburn during my visit). Thus equipped, I headed south towards San Diego to visit with well known contester Glenn Rattmann, K6NA.

When I arrived at Glenn's, he informed me that a bunch of the local DXers regularly get together for lunch on Fridays. Since this was Friday, we hopped into the convertible and headed into downtown Escondido for lunch at a Chinese all-you-can-eat buffet. (It sounds kinda wierd, but the food was actually quite good). There I met Rick, N6ND, Brian, K6STI (author of the YO/MN antenna modeling programs), as well as George, W6ZZ, and Jim, W6YA.

One of the first things that I noticed in California is that it is either extremely inconvenient, or terribly expensive, to acquire even a reasonable location for a contest station. Here in W8, most potential QTHs are neither outstanding nor terrible from the RF standpoint, and are affordable to quite a few of us. In southern California, there are many large hills, such that there is blockage in one direction or another for a station in the cities. Furthermore, the prices for even a modest home are outrageous.

After lunch, we headed out to the N6ND QTH, which is located on top of a rather large hill with a spectacular view in all directions. This station has been run multi-multi in several of the past DX contests, and is equipped with hardware appropriate for the task. The big tower is 200' of 45G, with a 2L KLM 80M yagi, plus three 20M

PV4 yagis, spaced evenly up the tower. The 80M beam and top 20M beam are independently rotatable. The second tower is 100' of 25G, with a 4L KLM 40 at 100', a homebrew 7L 10M yagi at 110', plus two other 5L 10M yagis stacked at 75'/50' on a common rotator. The third tower is also 100' of 25G, with stacked 5L/5L yagis for 15M. Inside, Rick runs a TS950SD and a much-modified Dentron DTR-2000 amplifier.

After visiting N6ND, we headed back down the mountain towards K6NA. The station is located on a ridge outside of Escondido, with an impressive view of its own. Glenn says that his QTH is about 25 miles inland from San Diego (which is on the ocean), and since the overall climate is dry, he has virtually no problems with salt corrosion on his antennas. In several directions, he has other hills higher than the station, but they are far enough away to not be a factor.

The K6NA station has three towers. The baby one next to the house is only 40' high with a 5L 10M yagi on top. The tower was originally intended to be 70', but Glenn says the 10M beam works well enough most of the time that there is little incentive to make it grow. Tower number two is 140' high, and has stacked 5L KLM 20s at 140'/60', and stacked 4L 15s on 3/4 wave booms at 155'/90'. Tower three is 140' high, with a homebrew 3L 40 and is also shunt-fed for 160. The top beams on towers two and three are turned with prop-pitch motors, with HAM-series rotators used for the others.

Glenn's antennas for 80 are quite interesting. Towers two and three are broadside to NE, and have 40' aluminum booms crosswise at the top at the 130' level. Stretched between these booms are a pair of 80M folded dipoles, fed individually with open wire line. One dipole is fed RF through the open wire via a Johnson Matchbox in the shack, while the other dipole is tuned as a reflector with a coil. Reversing directions is accomplished with relays. Glenn demonstrated the impressive F/B of the array, which seems to work quite well. To go NW/SE, he has a switchable parasitic inverted vee array.

The K6NA station RF is supplied from a TS940S and an Alpha 78.

After touring the antenna farm, we spent the evening chewing the rag about our common interests in contesting. The past few CQWWs, Glenn has been operating from 9Y4H, in addition

to performing most of the work to put the station up (80' tower, KT34XA, 40, etc.). He is also an expert on prop pitch rotators - we sat up until 2 AM while I picked his brain for solutions to the 40M rotator problem at K8CC.

The next morning, we set out for a visit to the W6MKB antenna farm. Terry lives on what would be a typical lot in most W8 cities, and in what appears to be suburban Escondido. For a picture of the W6MKB antenna farm, check page II-100 in ON4UN's book "Low Band DXing".

The tower at W6MKB is 120' of some sort of guyed commercial tower of bolt-together construction. Protruding 70' out of the top ofthis tower is a home-made self-supporting tower that rotates, supporting yagis for all bands from 3.5 through 432 MHz! Get a load of these antennas: 80M 3L full-size on a 80' boom, 40M 4L full-size on a 80' boom, 20M 8L on a 100' boom (unreal!), 8L 15, 8L 10, plus more VHF yagi elements than I could count! These are, without a doubt, the largest amateur antennas I have ever seen!

Inside, Terry is running a TS950S and one of the Alpha 77 amplifiers from the W6AM estate. In fact, you might have seen a picture of Terry's shack without realizing it. The recent amateur magazines have had Alpha advertising in them showing Jim Neiger, N6TJ smiling proudly for the camera with his DXpedition-ready Alpha 87. Jim does not have a domestic station of his own, so the photo was taken at Terry's operating position.

All too soon, it was time to make our way to the airport for the trip home. About this time, I was really feeling the effect of the sun from the previous afternoon, so I was glad to have nothing to do but sit for the next five hours or so. Nonetheless, I was sorry to have to leave. In my short time in W6, the southern California DXers/contesters made me feel tremendously welcome. W8UA and I are making plans to go to California for the Visalia DX/contest convention in April of next year. Maybe you'll want to join us.
