

From the 'Big Fish'

Greetings fellow contesters! Dayton is upon us and the boilers are stoked for maximum steam on the MRRC railroad. In fact, significant pressure has already been attained as evidenced by the events on the April 11th MRRC Monday Night Net. On that night, Ken, WD9INF, inquired (in a somewhat naive manner) about front-running prospects for electing the next 'Big Fish'. In a flash of MRRC efficiency, Ken was nominated, seconded, and unanimously elected **right there on 3828** KHz!! Unfortunately, after consulting Robert's Rules of Order, I must declare Ken's election to the post of Big Fish on 11 April 1994 null and void since an official club meeting was not properly called to order. I suspect that by the time the official Dayton meeting arrives, the MRRC electoral railroad may be reaching supersonic velocities. It is difficult to predict who will be caught in its path, although I expect Ken to arrive early for the meeting to best posture his defensive position.

Plans for this year's MRRC Dayton Hospitality Suite are well underway. Mike, AA8FE has been hard at work and has found two commercial sponsors to help offset the cost of the suite. There are still a few bartending slots which need to be filled - be sure to sign up with Mike. Everyone is **strongly encouraged** to bring station/operator photos, videos, banners, or other items for display. It would be great to show other contesters and DXers what MRRC is all about.

Results of the ARRL 160 contest once again had several MRRC stations post excellent scores. The multi-op category saw MRRC sweep the top four spots in the "Central Region" with the KN8Z, WR8C, AA8U and WD9INF crews finishing in 3rd, 4th, 7th and 8th place respectively. Ken, AA8AV, again gutted out a single op from K8CC for a Top Ten slot (3rd in the Central Region). We managed to break the one million point barrier with on nine entries. It should be noted that MRRC averaged over 125K per entry compared to 51K for the winning club, FRC. The Southest DX Club (who had the second highest average score per entry) has only 114K per entry - I wonder how the ARRL missed this in their contest analysis? The MRRC average score per entry would have been much higher if the 'Big Fish' had not turned in his extraordinary 108 point effort. P.S. - I think the new regional Iformat used in the ARRL 160 results for the top scores really stinks.

Elsewhere, **Barry**, **KF8TY** piloted **WD8LLD** to a #1 USA finish in the 20M single band category in the CQ WPX SSB Contest, more than doubling the second place score. The "ugly" crew at **AA8**U also had a great WPX showing with a #2 USA multi-single finish.

After serving two years as 'Big Fish', I've decided to let a new voice exert their influence as the leader of Mad River, particularly before someone figures out that the MRRC inflation rate was 140% this last year. In all seriousness, my tenure as 'Big Fish' has given me the opportunity to learn more about out club and its members. There have been many excellent MRRC scores these past two years, and we even managed to win a gavel. I take great pride in being associated with MRRC, and hope the membership gives the next 'Big Fish' as much support as I was given. I would like to thank the MRRC officers, and everyone who helped at the hospitality suites, hosted meetings, ordered badges, manned the MRRC flea market tables and engaged in other activities to support and promote MRRC.

THE DX RAG CHEWERS CENTURY CLUB AWARD

Have you ever had that feeling that something was at least a little bit stupid about sitting for hours in a rare DX pileup for the chance that the guy might come back to you to say "59 QSL QRZ"? Do you think rag chewing is something only for retired people in Florida describing their most recent doctor visit?

Well, you're not alone. So in an effort to put substance and challenge into these two of the most popular ham activities, the ARRL is pleased to announce the joining of two long time award programs to create a new award, the DX Rag Chewers Century Club, or DXRCCC. This will be earned by engaging in a minimum 30 minute QSO with amateurs in at least 100 different DXCC countries.

Initially there will only be a simple mixed mode award, though single mode and band and five band endorsements may be considered at a future date.

Credit for QSOs for DXRCCC will require QSLs showing both start and end time of the QSO. Furthermore, verification in the form of audio recordings may be required at the discretion of the DXRCCC administrator. QSOs involving more that two amateurs will require an additional 30 minutes for each amateur beyond two, i.e. a 4 person qso would require 90 minutes to be eligible for DXRCCC credit. The audio tapes would likely be required for multi-person QSOs in order to determine that the person seeking credit was appropriately involved in the QSO.

The DXRCCC has received corporate backing from an unusual sponsor. In recognition of the hurdles involved in combining these two seemingly diametrically opposed activities, Miller Brewing (who brings us those great Miller Lite commercials like Luge Bowling and Big Time Lawyer Rodeos) has agreed to establish a special fund to assist in sending world class rag chewers along on major DXpeditions. Hams willing to travel and able to ramble on in spite of tropical heat, polar cold, or political turmoil will be sought to pass out DXRCCC goos from rare corners of the earth.

A Miller spokesman said the combining of "Less Filling" DXing and the "Tastes Great" rag chewing was a marriage made in marketing heaven, and expressed confidence that Miller's move into the lucrative amateur "cold 807" market will provide good returns to the company in addition to good will from the amateur community.

As thousands of DXers have reached the very highest levels of the DXCC honor roll there have been many suggestions put forth to restart the program or add various endorsements. There also has been disillusionment with the low level of skill and effort required for DXCC in these days of DX nets and PacketCluster spotting systems. At the same time, rag chewers have been complaining about getting no respect from obnoxious DXpeditions and contests. The DXRCCC responds to these concerns and aims to provide the recognition and incentive for both groups. Good hunting and may you have many enjoyable conversations!

The starting date for DXRCCC QSOs is April 1. Please do not send cards or tapes until further details are announced.

Buying a Logging Computer

With Dayton right around the corner, now is the time to consider buying or upgrading a logging computer for the ham shack. Logging software gets better with every release, although sometimes it takes a better computer to see the benefit. However, if you haven't checked recently, you computer dollar goes a long way in today's market. Dayton's plethora of vendors offers a great opportunity to get just what you need at a steal.

If you already have a logging computer, buying just the pieces to upgrade your old machine makes sense. Otherwise, if you're looking for an entire computer, you'll probably get a better deal buying a complete system from one of the vendors.

There are five areas to consider in buying a logging computer:

CPU TYPE - There is no place else where your computer dollars make more improvement in performance than the computer "brain" or CPU. My recommendation is not to buy anything less than a 386 CPU, to get lots of computing power and powerful memory management capabilities. Right now, you can get a 40 MHz 386DX motherboard for around \$100, which is a great deal. However, my favorites are the motherboards using the 40 MHz Cyrix 486DLC. This chip is essentially the same as a Intel 486 without the math co-processor (which provides no benefit for logging anyways). 486DLC motherboards are typically around \$170.

MEMORY - You should have at least 1 MB of RAM on your computer, or 2 MB minimum if you want to run the new *CT*. Typically, the choice is 1 MB or 4 MB due to the way memory is arranged, and I recommend buying 4 MB which will cost an extra \$100. You can use the memory to hold extra QSOs, or run a disk cache to speed up your hard disk, or maybe get one of the internal voice keyers like a *DVP* or *VoiceBlaster*.

HARD DISK - None of the contest logging programs hog disk space, so just about anything will do. (My two dedicated logging computers plus my PacketCluster get along fine with 40 MB drives.) If you're gonna put all of your thousands of QSOs on the computer, you might want to consider a larger hard disk. Plan on paying less than \$1 per megabyte. Also, don't get hung up with floppy drives - they exist only to get files onto or off of the computer. Pick a size (3½ preferred) and go with it.

SERIAL & PARALLEL PORTS - It seems like you can never have too many ports on a logging computer, particularly in a multi-op setting. Even a single op might want to connect a digital radio, TNC, CW keying and a printer, so right there are two serial and two parallel ports. Most port I/O cards have two serials and a parallel - buy two and all your needs will be met. Note: be sure at least one of the cards can be set up as COM3 & COM4, with IRQs other than 4 and 3.

MONITOR - It seems like most contesters scrimp when it comes time to buy a monitor, when in reality it is one of the most important parts of the logging system. Think about it - you're staring at the monitor a large part of the time while operating, so why not get one that looks good? Color makes a world of difference in the display of data, so decide right now to take the plunge. What you want is a 14" or 15" VGA monitor, 0.28 mm dot pitch, 1024 x 768 resolution non-interlaced. My suggestion is to always ask to see the monitor in operation, because there are some really poor monitors around. If you stick with the specifications listed above, you should get a decent monitor for under \$300.

There are some other minor recommendations. At K8CC, I prefer to have my computers (I have *seven*) in tower cases. The mini-towers can be mounted beneath the operating desk and out of the way.

I used to prefer the old-style keyboards with the function keys on the left, but I have been won over by the 101 keyboards with function keys on the top. There is a small IBM keyboard available that saves valuable space on the operating desk - keep an eye out for one.

Hopefully, these notes are useful - good luck in your buying spree!
