

The 1994-95 MRRC Championship

The sunspots may have hit rock bottom, but you wouldn't know it by the scores turned in by the MRRC contingent. Totals were up slightly this year, with 51 operators totaling 47,318 points, or 928 per operator for the club, versus 54 ops, 45,851 points for 849 points per op last year.

Caribbean expeditions had a big effect on the scores at the top of the list. The winner of the 1994-95 MRRC Championship was **Bob Hayes**, **KW8N**, who parlayed a pair of CQWW 14 MHz operations from **KP2A** into big points. **Goose**, **WD8LLD** (2nd), **Doug**, **WD8AUB** (3rd) and **Don**, **K8MFO** (5th) were all part of the big W9VW memorial effort at **VP5VW**. The fourth place finisher, **Ken**, **AA8AV** never left the state, piling up his points at home or as a guest op at **K8CC**.

Its interesting to compare this season to last. The winning score from 1993-94 (WD8LLD) would have been eighth this year. However, last time there were nineteen scores over 1000 points, versus fourteen this year. This year's median score of 528 points was down from last year's 646. On a state basis, it was no contest as Ohio whomped Michigan 33,906 to 13,041.

The purpose of the MRRC Championship is to provide an additional incentive for members to submit their logs for MRRC in the club competitions. You might think that its only the "big guns" who finish high on the list. However, the structure of the Championship is such that you don't necessarily need huge antennas or sleepless 48-hour weekends to do well. Points for the Championship are accrued in both domestic and DX contests, many of which are less than 24 hours long. A reasonable station, competently operated in the majority of events, can finish very well.

The 1995-1996 MRRC Championship runs through the September 1996 NA Sprints. The 96-97 competition begins with the CQWW SSB in October. Next month's *FLASH* will contain the rules for the next MRRC Championship. Keep operating and sending in entries!

MRRC Summer Expeditions

It looks like a busy summer for a number of members who are heading out for DXpeditions or representing MRRC in competition. Here are some updates on their plans - get on and give the folks a QSO!

GOOOOO Mad River!

DXpedition to South Cook Islands Update By Bruce Lallethin, AA8U

AA8U, K8MJZ, AG8W and KA8KZJ will be going to ZK1, South Cook Island., Rarotonga. We will be on the air July 11-21. We intend to give 160M priority outside the IARU contest period so look for us around your sunrise on 1830 CW. If conditions are good enough, we might try SSB. Next priority will be 80M CW and SSB. We will be on the WARC bands when conditions permit. Watch your packet and if you hear us, please put out a spot for us and give us a call.

So far, we have been GENEROUSLY sponsored by Cushcraft to the tune of an R-7000 vertical and an A3SDX. Force12 is sending us a portable 2" aluminum mast kit to support the A3SDX. W4MPY will be doing our picture QSL cards after we return. Timewave has agreed to send us their new noise killer which should help our 160M effort. It isn't here yet, but if it doesn't show up, we will have my DSP 59+. Haven't heard confirmation from Yaesu, Kenwood, and MFJ yet but there is still time. I spent Saturday morning at Dayton before the club meeting talking with the various vendors about our trip and arranging possible sponsorships. It seems the time was well spent.

Our antenna farm on Rarotonga will consist of the tri-band beam (about 35' high) and a roof mounted multi-band vertical as mentioned previously. For 80M/160M, I built a nifty inverted-L. I have been using it lately, comparing it with my permanent antennas. It is surprising how well such a simple antenna can perform. It is virtually ground mounted, has a dozen radials, with the horizontal section 58' high. The feed point is equipped with a 28:50 ohm un-un for 160 and direct feed for 80M. If the trees and management allow, we will elevate the feed point 7-10' and string the six 133' radials to adjacent trees/structures. The shorter radials will form a conical shape, sloping away from the feed point. We have to be flexible. Stan has a trapped dipole for 40/80M. We'll string this up as an inverted-V somewhere. We will string at least one 500' Beverage if this is possible.

Our radio, thanks to AA8GL, will be his FT-900AT. Stan is taking his AL-811 amplifier so we will have a better chance of being heard. Our original plan included my FT-1000D. Baggage restrictions required a change of plans. Add to this list, a TS-50/PS-40 if Kenwood comes through in time. If Yaesu participates with an FT-900AT as planned, Bil's FT-900AT will be left home. If MFJ sends the Ameritron 811H amp in time, we'll leave Stan's amp home. Gotta plan for contingencies. HI

We are taking the XYL's so we won't be on the air ALL the time. We expect to do the tourist thing and keep them happy. I got my wife a GOLD card. I expect to get more operating time while she is off taking advantage of it.

We will operate the IARU HF Championship contest as a multi-single entry on CW and SSB signing **ZK1AAU**. From what I hear, our first Q will set a record. Our goal is to turn in a respectable score and I am certain we will have fun doing it. We will be also entering the VK/ZL 160M contest signing **ZK1MJZ** right at the end of our stay.

That is about it for now. Look for us if you have time, even if you don't need a a card form South Cook Islands. If you would like a neat ZK1 card, send your card with SASE to AA8U.

WRTC Preparations By Dave Pruett, K8CC

Things are getting hectic for the MRRC-sponsored World Radiosport Team Championship team of **Dave Pruett**, **K8CC** and **Stan Stockton**, **K5GO**. Just like our brethren going to the Pacific, we're busy making our plane reservations and packing our gear for the big event in San Francisco on July 13, 1996.

Our equipment lineup is pretty much dictated by the WRTC rules. We're allowed two radios, a "run" radio and a "SWL" radio. The WRTC judges have outlawed using sub-rcvrs, so we've decided to leave the FT-1000s at home and go with my pair of IC-765s, particularly since CW QSOs are worth twice as much as SSB. and the Icoms are good CW radios. For antennas, we're promised a tribander and a 40M dipole, so we have a transposing coax switch which swaps the two antennas between radios. We're not allowed bandpass filters, but we have an outboard lamp-fuse protector for the SWL radio. For logging, we're taking our own computer with monitor and keyboard (running NA software, of course!). A pair of Heil Pro-Sets, footswitch, cables and tools round out the station setup.

The WRTC rules are going to be rigidly enforced, with a judge on-site monitoring us with a tape recorder and headphones. We must turn in our log within ten minutes of the end of the contest, with severe penalties for busted QSOs. The logs will be checked during Sunday, with results available at the awards dinner on Sunday night.

We won't be given our three-letter callsign until two hours before the start of the event, so there will be no way to know if you're working us or not. Nonetheless, get on and give all the WRTC teams a QSO.

CONTEST HINTS

Author's Note: Here are some contest
"secrets," originally prepared for a pre-SS
training session for the Southern California
Contest Club two years ago. Some of the
"secrets" are for West Coast stations in the SS,
but most of them have general application.
Hope you find them interesting.

BEFORE THE CONTEST

Make a checklist like this one, customized to the needs of your individual station.

Set Computer to exact UTC time.

Set up computer files, cw/voice memories, keyboard overlay.

Simulate a few qso's on the computer, with rig interfaced, then erase log file.

Get prop forecast and make Miniprop runs.

Review past contest logs and magazine results.

Simultaneously update amp tuning chart, tuner memories, and check for RFI at 1500w, all bands, computer interfaced.

Contest eyeglasses handy. (Non-bifocal)

Lozenges handy for phone.

Coffee cup heater in place.

Make sure computer boots clean, with no unnecessary TSR's.

Verify attenuator, AIP, notch, noise blanker, split frequency all off.

Air Conditioner vents max open in radio room.

Telephone, high pass filters ready for handout to neighbors. Brief xyl.

Change vox delay.

Have contest rules handy.

Prepare sheet with suggested frequencies.

Prepare off-time sheet.

Do receiver noise survey with computer on. Does turning ant slightly help?

Establish a difficult, but achievable, goal for the contest.

Look at last year's rate sheet to finetune trategy for band changes.

Domestic contests - max antenna height 10M: 50', 15M: 75', 20M: 100' (6db down in east Texas).

DURING THE CONTEST - GENERAL

Ignore other peoples' numbers.

Some play games and off-times are unknown.

Very short pause between CQ's, so nobody can tune past while freq is silent.

Need VE8? Point antenna at 045 while running.

BAD - Who was the Yankee Zulu? GOOD - Yankee Zulu 253 B K6LL 59 AZ.

Maintain accuracy. Scores converge. Every gso is important.

No alcohol, except nightcap Sun a.m. and victory celebration Sunday night.

Population density - Western states advantage - Call CQ.

Use the highest band open, to avoid 9's working 1's, with the 9's aimed East.

Don't worry about mults until Sunday, unless you stumble across a good one.

Know who is running above and below you. Keep centered, but not too far away so somebody can sneak in.

Use automated cw and voicekeyer (BRAVO, K6LL, 59 ARIZONA.)

Motivation - Visualize pinned Smeters on the East coast.

Motivation - Remember your commitment to the SCCC. Operate full time.

Don't start on 40 Sunday morning. 20, then 15 ASAP.

DURING THE CONTEST - CW

Start at high speed (32-35), then slow down as the rate falls (26.) Adjust speed so ONE station is tailending. If a pileup grows, increase speed (40+) until it becomes manageable.

AGC off. Ride the RF gain control.

Tune RIT +/- 400 Hz after CQ.

Go high in the band (050) and send slow (25wpm) cq's once in a while.

In S&P mode, use LSB (cw reverse), tune from high to low to maximize collisions.

DURING THE CONTEST - SSB

Attract noncontesters with plaintive cq's. Make them say the full exchange.

Fast AGC, only to protect your ears. Ride the rf gain control to avoid compression.


Prolong 10 meter novice operation beyond maximum rate. These are unique contacts, and it will improve your nightime rate, when you work the "real" contesters.


