Greetings from the new MRRC 'Big Fish'! These are exciting times for the club, and I consider it a priviledge to be 'at the tiller'. The MRRC meeting at Dayton 2000 resulted in some of the most wideranges changes in club leadership in our history. Only the president and treasurer are elected by the membership - the rest are appointees, or perhaps 'volunteers' is a better term. Tornado hits K9TM QTH By Tim Mitchell K9TM

On Tuesday evening, May 9th, we were hit with very severe storms. Toledo Edison and others report that my QTH was in the path of a tornado. It is easy to believe as trees were sheared off around the 10-15 feet height. Many trees were uprooted and power lines were ripped down. I had the neighbors tree on my house and the driveway was blocked. There was damage to the garage door, roof (which busted a sheathing joint ,water leaks in now) and on the back of the roof. It crushed part of the ridge vent and the deck. It stripped many shingles and tar paper off the front half of the roof.

For about 2 houses on either side of me and for about 6 blocks there is a very distinct path of trees down, etc. One of my neighbors has part of a chimney in their yard and we can't figure out where it came from? Many neighbors are missing garbage cans and one is missing a big trampoline. We have looked around for several blocks and can't find it.

I joked before that with the big Trylon tower and the beefed up Cushcraft 40 that trees would be down and roofs would be off before this stuff would fail. It appears the engineering specs from Trylon and from Leason's book are accurate. However, there are three visible bends in the tower. One of the XA driven elements is dangling by the strap that connects the driven elements together (the boom-element). The beefed up Cushcraft 40 held up but the elements are bent pretty good. The mast is bent at about a 30-40 degree angle (2 inch diameter .25 inch wall) just above the thrust bearing and before the XA.

Several of my neighbors commented that they could not believe the tower was still up and trees around it were sheared off or uprooted. The mast was believed to be the weakest item in the system and that proved out in this uncontrolled experiment. The mast has taken 70-80 mph winds and no problems, however this was unlike anything I have ever experienced. Obviously 8 yards of concrete hold better than the roots on trees!

My TV mast was bent over and the TV antenna had elements twisted up in spirals. Iron poles that held the bird feeders were bent over almost down to the ground. The bird feeders are missing or one was embedded in the chain link fence...along with numerous shingles and other things.

A few days after the storm I was able to get a crane to come in and remove the antennas from the tower. We were on generator power for a couple of days as a result of the storm. Staci, the dog and I are all OK. They were in the basement and I was upstairs headed for the basement when it hit. Next time I hear the tornado

MRRC Profiles

Author's Note: This column is being introduced to help us get more acquainted with some of our newer club members and to eventually profile some of our long-time members. I will eventually be calling on each of you provide some information about yourself for this column.)

Paul Valentine, **Jr.**, **KC8FXR** is one of the newer members to MRRC having joined the club a little over a year ago. Paul is 50 years old, married, and lives in Ypsilanti, Michigan (*not far from the K8CC antenna farm - ed*).

Paul states that he has been a ham for three years "this time." He was introduced to ham radio by his father Paul, Sr. K8OVV-SK and was first licensed as a Novice in 1969 with the call sign of WN8ICF. Those were the days of the two year nonrenewable Novice license which permitted CW only operation using crystal controlled radios. Paul worked a "little CW" with that license and let it expire. He was relicensed as a Novice with the same call in 1977. He let this license also expire without upgrading, got married, and ignored the hobby for twenty years.

When Paul's sister decided to try for her ham ticket, her husband Larry, WN8NXI began urging Paul to get back into the hobby. With all this family incentive, Paul earned his Tech-Plus license and upgraded to General a few months later. Florence also successfully earned her ticket and now holds an extra class license with their father's call.

Paul ham radio interest includes building simple radios. After a few mistakes in some of his projects, Paul got some help from MRRCer **Bill**, **N8ET** and reports that everything that he has recently constructed works. He plans on building a Tuna Tin 2 in the near future.

Paul's favorite contests are WPX and IARU. He likes WPX because there is a lot of activity and he can work anyone. He has some sentimental feelings for IARU be cause it was his first contest. Paul says, "I stumbled into it and made about 25 contacts. I typed up the list of stations that I worked and kept it like a trophy!"

Paul likes CW the best because he feels that he is operating on a more level playing field than he is with SSB. "The bigger stations can clobber me on SSB. It seems easier to make contacts with CW." He also mentions that he is working to get a little faster on the code which will come with time and experience. Paul has also thinks that the recent Michigan and Ohio QSO Parties has been a good way to get on and hone his operating skills.

Paul's station consists of a TS-850, several QRP rigs, and a Hallicrafters HT-40 that he built a long time ago. His antenna farm presently consists of a Carolina Windom that is about 30 feet high in the back yard.

Paul joined Mad River when he received an invitation from Dave, K8CC after being listed in the 1998 Sweepstakes results. Since most of the hams he knew were not interested in contesting, joining MRRC provided Paul with contesters that he could talk to and learn from. Paul has been quite active in many of the contests over the past year and can also be found on the Mad River Radio Club Reflector. He would like to see the club grow and attract more new members. In addition to Mad River, Paul is a member of ARCI, MIQRP, FISTS, and the South Lyon Area Amateur Radio Club.

Paul is a sales manager for Albin Business Centers which markets Konica office products.



The Mad River Radio Club 1999 Field Day will be held at the Case Western Reserve Squire Valleyvue Farm near Cleveland, OH. The club plans to be operating class 2A, with two HF positions plus a VHF position (50/144). At press time, tentative ops are Dave-K8CC, Jim-K8MR, Jeff-KU8E and Goose-W8AV, but walk-ins are welcome.

Field Day is also an official MRRC meeting, attendance at which is counted towards the two meetings required to meet ARRL rules for submitting scores in the Affiliated Club competitions. Stop on out to the site and make half of your two meeting requirment for the 1999-2000 contest season.

Directions (see map below): On the east side of Cleveland, take I-271 to the Cedar Road exit. Go east on Cedar Road to SOM Center (also called Route 91). Turn right (south) on SOM Center to Fairmount Blvd. Turn left (east) on Fairmount and go about a mile to the farm entrance which is on the left. The address is 37125 Fairmount Blvd.
