One of the biggest challenges faced by just about any club is getting people to participate in the running of the organization. It seems like often the old "80-20" rule applies – 80% of the work gets done by 20% of the people. I think MRRC is better than most; with a lot of our current activities like "Suite In The Sun", MiQP/OhQP, sponsoring meetings, etc., much of the club work is being spread around.

However, I sometimes worry that there are "two" MRRCs. One MRRC (the "visible" one) is represented by those on the MRRC Monday Night Net, and those who are active on the MRRC Reflector. The other, "hidden" MRRC is represented by everyone else – the members who pay their dues and make their meetings, then watch what happens. To illustrate this, consider that as this is written, we have 74 people on the roster. We typically have between four and twelve people show up for the Monday Night Net – the rest are the "hidden" members. The MRRC Reflector has only 44 members subscribed to it – the other 30 are "hidden".

I make this point not to bust any chops nor embarrass anyone, but rather to ask these questions of MRRC's "hidden" members: Are you happy with the club as it is? Are you glad to be part of this club? Does your association with the club increase your enjoyment of amateur radio? Hopefully the answers to all of the above questions are positive. However, I'd like to ask one more: What would you like to see MRRC do that its not doing now?

Between my contacts in contesting and the newsletters we exchange with other organizations, I get to see how

Unfortunately, Marty admits that he had other things to occupy his time and never took the necessary steps toward obtaining a license until the summer of 1993. He began studying in that year and was licensed as a Novice with call of KB8RSH in February 1994. Marty claims that no one really stood out as an "Elmer" to assist him in getting his first license although he credits Walt, WB8E and Mike, WX3L for encouraging him to upgrade. The encouragement worked pretty well because Marty upgraded to

Technician nine months after receiving his initial license, and earned his Extra Class license five months later. He sported the call KG8QT between April, 1995 and December, 1996 when he applied for and received his current call, N8MG.

Marty lists as his hobbies, outside of Ham Radio, his wife Paulette (I thought that was a full time occupation instead of a hobby.....Ed.) and his three children Harold, KB8UCH; Dale KC8EMO; and Alicia. It is rumored that he will also be entering the world of being a grandfather this fall which will yet become another facet of the aforementioned hobby.

"MG" also claims to enjoy a good game of chess although he admits he is still a bit of a patzer at the game.

Between 1994 and 1998 Marty ham radio career centered around traffic handling. He has been NCS for the both the Southeast Michigan VHF Traffic Net and the Michigan Traffic Net and an occasional check-in to the QMN CW Traffic Net. 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He remains the contest. proud of that accomplishment to this day.

When asked about how he learned and became interested in MRRC, Marty ex plains, "Mike, WD8S mentioned several times about going out to K8CC's station to operate. This past spring, Mike, over breakfast one morning, mentioned CQ WPX and asked me to join him. I contacted Dave to be sure that it was all right and the rest is history." He likes the professionalism of contesting at Dave's and the general professionalism he sees in Mad River. He is hoping that he can add a new perspective to MRRC as he gains more exposure to the club and its workings.

The N8MG station consists of an FT1000MP with a Heil Proset, a Kenwood TS-50 as a backup and mobile transceiver, and a Yaesu FT5100 dual band FM transceiver. A Cushcraft R7000,

Outpost and Outbacker antennas, a long wire for 80 meters, and a Comet G9 VHF/UHF antenna make up the antenna farm. Marty just purchased the Outpost antenna and states that it compares very favorably to the R7000 and in some cases is a bit better. He wishes that he could accommodate some larger antennas but is restricted by the size of his city lot.

Marty is presently studying Electrical Engineering at the college level, since he is presently on layoff from General Motors. However at GM, Marty has worn a number of occupational hats from an assembler at the Pontiac Truck Plant, to truck driver, dock chief, inspector, and toolmaker apprentice. Although he is not exactly in a deep love affair with Calculus, Marty plans to have the EE degree completed by the time he is eligible for retirement from GM. He resides at 26242 Woodingham in Warren, Michigan.
