From the Big Fish Dave Pruett, K8CC k8cc@mediaone.net

There may be many of you who don't know the history of how MRRC was formed. While many of us know about the 'asterisk year', we are mostly unaware of the details of how (and perhaps more importantly, why) our club got started. Thanks to the records of original 'Big Fish' Dick, K8MZ (originally K8EHU) we have a many of the early FLASHs. Trying to put together a timeline is difficult because most of the early newsletters aren't dated. However, the by 'reading between the lines' we can piece the story together.

During the weekend of the 1971 Dayton Hamvention, a meeting was held to discuss the formation of a midwest contest club. In those days, a contest club was a rare thing and the ARRL Affiliated Club Competitions were dominated by the most part by the Potomac Valley Radio Club (PVRC), Murphy's Marauders and the Frankford Radio Club. There were no Local/Medium/ Unlimited categories then; just one big competition such that the bigger clubs ruled. The objective behind this meeting in April 1971 was to invite contesters from Ohio and the surrounding states for the purpose of creating a midwest club to challenge these big, established, eastern clubs.

The meeting generated a lot of interest. The initial roster shows 36 members, including some operators still active today such as N4AR, W8KIC, W8OSE, N8AA, K8NZ, W8WA, NA8V, N9RV, N8NA, K8MR and K8RR. As the first MRRC 'Big Fish, K8EHU filed papers to affiliate with the ARRL. An MRRC 'on-air get-together' was started on the last Tuesday of the month on 3907 KHz. As the months until SS counted down, a recruiting drive to increase the membership was undertaken and a goal was set to win the 1971 SS Affiliated Club Competition. By SS time the roster

contained over 130 members.

When the dust settled from the two weekend of the 1971 SS, MRRC claimed a score of just under 10 million points from 174 entries. PVRC was second with 8.7M from 133 entries and Murphy's was third with 7.4M from 116 entries. Murphy's filed a protest almost immediately and after five months of political wrangling, MRRC's 1971 SS Affiliated Club entry was disqualified. The stated grounds for the disqualification was the fact that the only 'in person' meeting the club had held was the first meeting at Dayton 1971; all the subsequent meetings had been on 3907 KHz.

MRRC's 'asterisk year' brought changes to the ARRL Affiliated Club Program. Although the '175 mile radius' and 'attend two meetings per year' rules were already in place, the fallout from 1971 included clarification of what constituted a meeting, and later the separate Local, Medium and Unlimited categories. The effect of the disqualification on MRRC itself was even more profound. Within a year or two, club activity dwindled to almost nothing until revived again in 1976.

Fast forward to 2001.

MRRC is now thirty years old. We are not a new organization, but rather an established, well-known contest club. We are active – we sponsor and run two major QSO parties, and we organize teams for the NAQPs and Sprints. MRRC members regularly top the various categories in SS, however we've only won an SS gavel twice and not since 1995. We lost this past year by only 60K. We also lost the ARRL 160M Affiliated Club Competition by 70K.

MRRC was formed originally to compete in Affiliated Club Competitions. Sparked by a comment from Mike, K9NW I want to pro-

pose that MRRC set out to win the Medium Category in the four ARRL Affiliated Club Competitions held in conjunction with HF contests. Consider these facts concerning the contests in question:

Sweepstakes: We only lost by 60K in 2000, and for 2001 we've been joined by some of our colleagues from the North Coast Contesters who are capable of adding ten to fifteen times that amount to the MRRC total. Indeed, with 60-70 people on the club roster, the challenge will be to focus on maximizing the number of points per entry by organizing multi-ops and minimizing part time efforts. MRRC can win this!

ARRL 160: MRRC has always had low-band specialists who have provided most of our score in this one. However, because this is a single-contest competition (as opposed to SS where there are separate CW and SSB contests combined), we can try to overwhelm the competition with activity. Last year, we only had thirteen entries, but the winner (FRC) only had 16! With 60-70 people on the club roster, MRRC can win this!

ARRL 10: This contest does not really favor MRRC propagation-(Continued on page 2)

wise, but with a good station and a maximum effort, a lot of points can be made. In 2000, MRRC was sixth with 6.7M points from only sixteen entries – 2M of thse points came from K9NW's single-op effort alone. The winner (FCG) had 18.8M from 31 entries. Again, because this is a single-contest competition, MRRC can overwhelm the competition with activity. If we focus on multi-ops and mixed-mode entries (where the totals are typically double or triple the single-mode entries) 20M would not be hard to beat. If MRRC wants this, we can win it!

ARRL DX: This is a very challenging competition, where station size and a willingness to spend 48 hours in the chair by a lot of people is needed to top the listing. MRRC lacks the number of big stations needed to compete – we do OK on CW where the big multis from K8CC
