### From the Big Fish Dave Pruett, K8CC k8cc@mediaone.net

Oh well – summer is over, fall is upon us and its time to start thinking about the upcoming contest season. Hopefully all of our antenna projects are done and we're ready to strap into the chair and start operating, because as I write this Sweepstakes CW is only two weeks away.

At the past two MRRC meetings, the MRRC leadership has outlined a vision for the club to pursue winning the Medium Category in the Affiliated Club Competitions for this season's ARRL contests (SS, ARRL 160, ARRL 10 and ARRL DX). Sweepstakes is first up, and its Affiliated Club Competition is the one in which we have the most interest. Last year we missed winning the gavel by only 60K. We don't want to let that happen again this vear.

ated Club Competition are pretty simple: any club member in good standing living within 175 miles of the club center, and who has attended two club meetings in the last twelve months is eligible to submit his or her individual score(s) to be added to the club total. A MRRC member is in good standing if his or her dues are current. Elsewhere in this FLASH you'll find a list of members who have attended two or more meetings in the past year (Christmas Party, Ypsilanti, Dayton, Field Day, Wooster, Findlay and Zanesville) and who the club certifies to reside within the club circle.

To compete in the Medium Category, MRRC is allowed a maximum of 50 entries. An entry is a score if K8CC operates SS CW and SS phone, this counts as two entries. The number of opera-

tors does not matter - if K8CC, WX3M and WD8S get together and do a multi-op on SSB, this counts as one entry. Obviously, we'd like to have exactly 50 entries; if we have 51 or more we move into the Unlimited Category.

Last year, we had 45 entries in our "close but no cigar" finish. Since the club roster typically contains roughly 70 members, MRRC certainly has the potential to (Continued on page 2)

bust the 50 entry limit. Since last year, a number of our friends from the North Coast Contesters have joined MRRC, many of whom are active, successful SSers. While their points will certainly bolster the MRRC total, it further makes the 50 entry limit an even greater concern.

I'd like to take a moment to look at last year's SS results, grouping our scores by points:

As a club, our 45 entries in the 2000 SS only averaged <u>a little over 60% of the available operating time</u>. Over one third of our entries operated less than 25% of the available time. It's clear from looking at these numbers that the more you operate, the more points you make. These are the lessons we must take away from the 2000 SS.

We have 50 available entry "slots" – how do we best utilize them? In the past we've encouraged everyone to get on because often we've come up short on the number of entries and every score helps. This year the situation is different, however MRRC is not going to set points quotas, tell people not to operate or not to submit their scores. While we truly do want to win, this is not who we are as a club.

If you want to operate SS, go ahead and operate – big gun or little gun, we leave it up to you. However, if you plan to operate SS and submit your score for MRRC keep in mind that you will be filling one of our 50 available "slots" and so the club asks that you do whatever you can to maximize the score that goes into that slot. Here are some ideas how to do just that:

- Operate as much as you can. Plan specific operating times rather than relying on hit or miss around family schedules. Activity is higher on Saturday, and conditions are best for us W8 during the evening. Remember, for a W8 "there's no meters like forty meters"!
- If you're going to operate less than full time, consider entering the category with the highest points potential. For example, if you only have five hours to operate don't spend it running QRP when low or high power will produce many more points for the club. If you have packet access, perhaps try running in the "unlimited" category. On the other hand, if you have an objective to seriously compete full time in one of the lower categories, don't feel like you have to forego this for the club.
- If you and several of your MRRC friends are unable to operate full time, why not organize a multi-op? If several part-timers share a single station the result is usually more points for the club and only one "entry slot" is used. Another advantage of a multi-op is that it allows members with poor or no stations to significantly contribute to the club score. Also, ARRL rules state that only 2/3 of a multi-op team have to be eligible members, so its permissible to staff a multi-op with ineligible members or even non-members as long as the 2/3 proportion is met.

To facilitate planning for SS, MRRC has appointed "area coordinators" who will be contacting members by e-mail, offering to assist putting plans in place to maximize MRRC SS activity from that area. The coordinators are:

If you're looking for help getting ready, for a place to operate or for multi-operator staff, drop an e-mail to your area coordinator and he'll see what can be done. Mike Tessmer will also be continuing his role as overall coordinator and score reporter for the MRRC SS effort.

People, we CAN win the SS Affiliated Club Competition Medium Category, but it will take a well-planned and coordinated effort. The K8CC station plans to lead the charge by hosting full-gonzo multi-op efforts on both modes. We should all take inspiration from the Society of Midwest Contesters who slayed the NCCC Goliath and took the SS Unlimited Category in 2000. SoMC president K9PG commented to me at Dayton how cool it would be if SoMC and MRRC won our respective categories in 2001. The SCCC is our Goliath - let's make it happen!

# MRRC Profiles: KI8IZ By Goose Steingrass , W8AV w8av@aol.com

Tom Cloyes, KI8IZ, is one of MRRC's newest members. He has had the chance to meet and talk with many of our members during the various contests at W8AV and at the summer Gooseapalooza meetings over the past two years. Liking what he has experienced at these events and having been bitten hard by the contesting bug, Tom officially joined the club at this year's Findlay meeting.

Tom's career in amateur radio is rather brief. He has always had an interest in radio since the 1960's but as he describes:

"It wasn't until June of 1998 when I was handed the Now You're Talking book that I though about seriously becoming a ham. After that it didn't take much prodding to take the plunge and become licensed." He credits Jim Smith, KI8FN from Mount Vernon, Ohio with providing him with a lot of help in the early going, especially with learning the code. This early help paid off as Tom was licensed as a Technician in August of 1998 with the callsign KC8KSX.

Tom soon met up with Goose, W8AV who was teaching Amateur Radio classes in early 1999 and credits AV with helping him increase his code speed and providing en couragement to try the higher speed code tests before feeling mentally ready to tackle them. KSX easily passed the 13 wpm code and the theory to upgrade to Advanced in the July of 1999. He also requested a callsign change at this time and was issued KI8IZ with his Advanced Class license. Less than one year later, IZ completed the required elements to obtain his Extra Class ticket. Tom reminisces about the day he passed the 20 WPM test:

"I was sitting in on a test session and there was this guy taking the 20 wpm test, which I had just copied in my head, and found that it wasn't that hard. So when he decided to take it again, I felt that I had to take it as well, copying enough to pass and finish up the upgrade to Extra."

Tom's hobbies outside of ham radio include amateur astronomy, computers, girl watching, hunting, and occasional fishing. He is also very active in organizations that pro mote restoring the government to the framework of the Constitution. His amateur radio interests include DXing and of course contesting. He is very active in Skywarn and also serves as the communications liaison for the Red Cross Disaster Team.

KI8iZ's favorite "home participation" contests are CQWW SSB, ARRL DX SSB, and WPX SSB. The CW contests are spent at W8AV's station where he provides valuable assistance as a relief op and multiplier hunter. Tom's home station consists of an Icom 756 and a Cushcraft R-700 which is mounted atop his 60 foot tower. The guys are insulated from the tower and serve as an 80 meter dipole. He also has an Icom 706 MKII that he uses on HF as well as 6 and 2 meters, as well as for packet. His VHF antennas consist of vertical antennas for 6 and 2 meters on the tower and a five element yagi for 6 meters that is roof mounted on his garage.

Tom is single (no wonder he can get away with all that girl watching....W8AV) and lives at 608 Spruce Street in Wooster, Ohio. He is self employed and is the owner of PM Supply Co. Which is a reseller for construction materials.
